MESSAGE FROM THE HEADMISTRESS



I asked the whole community to strive to be more human

The exploration of what it means to be human is a profound journey, especially during the formative years when we seek our place in a world that is both enchanting and occasionally unsettling. Reflecting on this theme with the community of EHS at the start of term, I was profoundly influenced by Matt Haig's "The Humans," a book that grapples with the essence of humanity.

The novel introduces an extraterrestrial on a mission to eliminate a man, Andrew Martin, who has made a groundbreaking mathematical discovery with the potential for immortality. The extraterrestrial, repulsed by human quirks and habits, assumes Andrew's identity but undergoes a transformative journey. Initially driven by a disdainful view of humanity, he becomes enamoured with the human capacity for forgiveness, caring, and hope.

Through the alien lens, the book unravels the contradictory, messy, infuriating, and wondrous facets of the human condition. It concludes with poignant and quirky advice for humans:

- Don't worry about your abilities. You have the ability to love. That is enough.
- No-one is ever completely right about

anything. Anywhere.

- Kindness is always courage. But caring is what makes you human. Care more, become more human.
- In your mind change the name of every day to Saturday. And change the name of work to play.
- If you think something is ugly look harder. Ugliness is just a failure of seeing.

Building on this contemplation, I delved into another medium with the pupils—movies, and specifically the recent Barbie movie— which, surprisingly, also provided insights into the complexities of being human. Barbie begins the movie in the fantasy space of Barbieland, where she and the other Barbies hold all the power and influence. In Barbieland, the only role that exists for Ken is following Barbie around. Kens don't really matter in Barbieland, so he doesn't know where he fits.

The perfect bubble of Barbieland bursts when Barbie starts experiencing anxiety and insecurity about herself: the result of the human playing with her in the Real World having similar thoughts. So, she and Ken head to the Real World to find this stressed-out human, and Barbie becomes suddenly aware of the full emotional weight of what it's really like to be a woman. She begins to question whether she is good enough, smart enough, capable enough and pretty enough.

Ken, on the other hand sees how men in the Real World so often occupy positions of power, and hold influence, and he decides that bringing those ideas back to Barbieland is the key to his happiness.

Ultimately, the movie has lessons for all. Barbie realises that it's no longer fulfilling to her to just be an "idea" of a woman. Her path to joy lies in becoming human and accepting all the complexities that go along with that. In turn, Ken learns that neither hyper-masculinity nor his role as Barbie's non-essential sidekick are going to make him happy. He must figure out who he is and what he wants on his own terms.

Ultimately, the movie, like "The Humans", invites serious reflection on what it means to be human.

It echoes the idea that being human involves navigating through messiness, complexity, and emotions. Being fully human is a journey marked by caring, love, and kindness as well as embracing the pain and joy of life.

So, as we embarked on this term, I asked the whole community to strive to be more human, to embrace the beauty of our complexities and continue to foster a culture of care and kindness. They rose spectacularly to this call, and they have shown their willingness to come out of their comfort zones, have challenging conversations in a respectful way, commit to charitable causes, support their peers through mentoring programs, embark on environmental stewardship, take an active engagement with the local community, and continue our development of an inclusive culture that celebrates diversity. These efforts have once again collectively contributed to the wonderfully compassionate and supportive school community that is Edgbaston High School.


“I left EHS in 1994. I’ve recently published my debut novel, *The Berliners* (John Murray) which tells the stories of six characters who all live in the same apartment in Friedrichstrasse 19, but at different points in history.”

Emma Harding grew up in Birmingham and works as a BBC radio producer. *Friedrichstrasse 19* is her first novel.

Excerpt from the novel:

‘Sometimes I get fanciful and think the buildings speak. That all their history is locked into the walls and if you listened closely enough, you could hear all the people who’d once been there.’ Sigi lived upstairs from Sara at Friedrichstrasse 19 yet before they met, Sara had no idea that Berlin could be so thrillingly irreverent or that sex could be so intoxicatingly wonderful. But then came the war, and hunger, loneliness and barbed wire. It was just as a young girl, a protegee of The Academy of Magical Arts situated in Friedrichstrasse at the start of the century, had predicted. Battered and divided, Berlin, like its people, endured. Hans yearns to be part of the boundary-breaking spirit of the age but he’s haunted by his mother’s part in the war and the absence of a father. Ilse, who escaped from the East, wants nothing more than the freedom she risked her life for. In 1989 in a wild act of spontaneous joy, Heike leapt from the Wall into the arms of a stranger from the West. Thirty years later, she recognises that what she’d willed to be destiny was nothing more than naivety. Recently divorced, she moves into Friedrichstrasse, to begin a new life. But it’s impossible not to hear the echoes of the secrets and lies, visions and misunderstandings, lost loves and fatal mistakes, that have come before her. Time-travelling between decades, through the interlocking lives of six people, *Friedrichstrasse 19* relives the tumultuous experience of a city on the frontline of history.

The Berliners is out now in paperback.

Sarah has been in touch to tell us about her life in Jamaica. Please see her piece below:

Greetings from the land of Bob Marley and Jerk Chicken

I am writing this from a small fishing village on the south coast of Jamaica called Treasure Beach, which has become my second home-from-home over the last twelve years.

I originally came here in 2011 for a two-week holiday with my two youngest children and fell in love with the people and its unspoilt, low-key vibe and beautiful coves and landscapes. After several years returning again and again I bought a piece of land near the beach and together with a local designer and builder, created my beautiful Hummingbird Cottage, a three bedroom eco-villa with pool and landscaped tropical gardens.

I currently spend four to five months a year here, and when I am back in the UK I rent it out to people from all over the world who are visiting this part of the island. It is a great feeling to be sharing this experience with others, while at the same time contributing to the local community. employing people to help look after the property and the guests who stay here.

I have gained so many good friends, both local and those, like me. who are from further afield who have also fallen in love with the place. There is a very strong community here and I feel very accepted and supported, especially since I had eye problems at the beginning of 2022 that mean my vision is significantly reduced.

I was especially excited to host three of my best EHS friends (Year of 1977) in November; Hannah Madin-Gray, Candida (Candy) Wasley (nee Hamer), and Frances Galloway (nee Brewster). We had such a great time together, enjoying great Jamaican hospitality and cuisine, and exploring the local area.

A local fisherman took us to Black River Sanctuary to see the crocodiles and abundant bird life there, followed by a drink at the famous Pelican Bar (a bar on stilts in the sea), and the beautiful YS Falls, with its lush, tropical vegetation and spectacular waterfalls. We also visited the Appleton Estate to see how the local rum is made (and lots of opportunity for tasting!). There was also lots of relaxing by the pool, swimming, beach walks. meeting locals and eating in local restaurants. At the same time, we loved reminiscing about school days, old friends, and catching up on the years since school.



Spending time here has only emphasised the importance of family, friends, and community, especially in these times. I also realise how privileged I am to have the opportunity to experience a different climate and culture in a deeper way, that visiting as a tourist alone can't provide.

I attended Edgbaston High School from Early Years in Westbourne, right the way through until the end of the Sixth Form in 1977.

I became a lifelong member and always enjoyed reading the latest news, but unfortunately lost touch with Laurel Leaves when I moved from Hertfordshire to Essex about eight years ago. Fortunately, I recently linked up with others in my year who are still in touch

with the association so it was an ideal opportunity to reconnect with the magazine.

I am retired from the teaching profession and enjoy life in the country with my husband and white German Shepherd. I have two sons, both settled with partners, and am now a grandmother to Alfie, born last year. What a joy he is.

In my spare time I play lots of golf, enjoy gardening and walking my dog with my sister who lives nearby.




Excellent book - finished in one weekend
